#### Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

\*<u>S6M-15972</u> Meghan Gallacher: Introduction of NOVA Scotland—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the importance of having a service of support and guidance for veterans, such as those in the Central Scotland region, including those in the justice system; understands that, whilst veterans are not more likely to commit a crime than civilians, they are more likely to engage with the justice system; further understands that, in England, Op NOVA has a decade of experience working in partnership with health and justice systems to support veterans in living healthy, stable and crime-free lives, and that it provides emotional and practical support to veterans at all points of the justice system, including pre-arrest, arrest, post-arrest and those serving a custodial sentence; considers that, having been built on the foundations of Forces Employment Charity's Project Nova, it has an evidence base and proven framework to deliver life-changing support to veterans with established partnerships in the justice sector; notes the belief, therefore, that NOVA Scotland would be crucial in enabling veterans to live stable lives by providing access to practical and emotional support across a variety of areas, and further notes the calls for the Scottish Government to look at measures to introduce NOVA Scotland.

\*S6M-15956 Alexander Stewart: Growing Health Inequalities—That the Parliament understands that Scotland has a 25-year gap in healthy life expectancy between the most and least deprived areas, with overall life expectancy decreasing to 76.5 years for males and 80.7 years for females when it was last measured between 2020 and 2022; notes the view that, with 50% of health inequalities linked to social and environmental factors, greater investment in preventative services is instrumental in improving the health and wellbeing of communities; understands that, in 2022, the Health Foundation carried out an independent review of health inequalities in Scotland to provide a detailed and thorough analysis of the trends and wider factors that have influenced people's health, including in the Mid Scotland and Fife region, over the previous two decades; notes that this was following reported concerns regarding widespread and persistent health inequalities, which, it considers, were almost certainly widened farther because of the COVID-19 pandemic; believes that, while it is fair to observe that improvements may also have stalled across the whole of the UK, Scotland currently has the lowest average life expectancy at birth of all of the four nations, and one of the lowest in western Europe; notes the view that, as the older population is expected to grow by 30% by 2045, with the potential for accelerated growth across rural and island communities, it is essential that key services, including health and social

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care, education and transport, need to be resourced to adapt with growing and changing demands, and further notes the view that having a healthy population should be one of Scotland's most important assets and can have a vital input into people's wellbeing and building a thriving society and economy.

\*S6M-15955 Alexander Stewart: Additional Support Needs in Scotland—That the Parliament acknowledges that, in Scotland, additional support needs (ASN) is a term used to describe the requirements for an estimated 190,000 children and young people, or 26.6% of all school pupils, who require extra help to reach their full learning potential; believes that ASN can include having motor or sensory impairments, learning difficulties such as dyslexia, English as an additional language or a myriad of emotional and social difficulties; notes that all schools have a duty to provide appropriate support and that this requirement was laid out in the Education (Additional Support for Learning) Scotland Act 2004; further notes that the Additional Support for Learning: Statutory Guidance 2017 sets out that schools have a number of responsibilities to support pupils who have ASN, such as making adequate and efficient provision for the support required, publishing, reviewing and updating specified information about their ASN policy, providing the parents of the pupils with all of the information that they are required to publish, providing, where needed, co-ordinated support plans for the pupils, and keeping this under regular review, and providing independent and free mediation services for parents and pupils, including publishing information about these services; believes that, with the right resources and focus, schools and further education settings, including those in Stirling and Clackmannanshire, can create a wholeschool environment with an emphasis on inclusion and cooperation and delivering high aspirations; further believes that social and emotional skills programmes, which aim to build resilience through learning or coordinated support plans, can build skills step by step to bring success and give pupils with ASN a chance to test their skills out and receive encouragement and feedback, developing inclusiveness that can be encouraged through good quality health and wellbeing lessons, promoting relationships and diversity, supporting pupils to feel accepted and to belong; believes that, in addition to myriad other ambitions, they can help to deal with, and reduce, bullying and discrimination, and notes the calls that, in order for all pupils with ASN to benefit in full from their education, the support that they receive should be tailored to meet their individual needs and build on their strengths to help them overcome any difficulties that they experience.

\*S6M-15952 Alexander Stewart: Health and Social Care Integration in Scotland—That the Parliament understands that the way that health and social care services are planned and delivered was changed by the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014 in order to require local authorities and NHS boards to deliver adult community health and social care services, including services for older people at the right time and in the right setting during their care journey, with a focus on community-based and preventative care; believes that 31 health and social care partnerships were set up to manage around £9 billion in resources with the Act requiring local authorities and NHS boards to jointly prepare an integration scheme, which sets out the key arrangements for how services are planned, delivered and monitored in their areas; notes that there is a choice of ways in which they may do this, they can either delegate functions between each other, which is known as the lead agency arrangement or they can delegate to a third body, the integration joint board (IJB); understands that 30 areas adopted the IJB model, with Clackmannanshire and Stirling forming one with NHS Forth Valley; considers this IJB's membership to be broad, as it includes local authority councillors, NHS non-executive directors and others who do not possess voting rights, including professional representatives and community and staff stakeholders; notes that each IJB receives delegated funds from their NHS board and local authority, as there is no separate direct funding from the Scottish Government,

and acknowledges the reported significant financial challenges that IJBs have been experiencing for some considerable time.

#### Other new and altered motions and amendments

\*<u>S6M-15982</u> Jackie Baillie: Supporting USDAW's Calls to Give Shopworkers a Break on New Year's Day—That the Parliament believes that the Scottish Government should give shopworkers the right to what it sees as a well-deserved break on New Year's Day; considers that some retail workers face challenges in working on New Year's Day, due to a lack of public transport and childcare provision; understands that the Christmas Day and New Year's Day Trading (Scotland) Act 2007 prohibits trading in most large shops on Christmas Day, and gave powers to the Scottish Ministers to stop the opening of those shops on New Year's Day; considers that the Scottish Government continues to refuse to use that power to give shopworkers a proper festive break; believes that retail staff work incredibly hard all year round and that their work is particularly busy and stressful throughout December; further believes that retail staff deserve to be able to spend time with family and friends over the festive period, and commends USDAW's ongoing efforts to secure the right to a break for shopworkers in Scotland. **R**

\*<u>S6M-15981</u> Fulton MacGregor: Congratulations to Palacerigg Community Trust—That the Parliament welcomes the news that Palacerigg Community Trust has signed a lease, and taken ownership of the keys, for the visitor centre in the park; believes that this was only possible through years of hard work by local residents, who formed Palacerigg Community Trust; congratulates all involved in the project and praises the improvements that have already been made to the playpark and walk ways; considers that this will be widely welcomed by the local community, and believes that those who utilise Palacerigg Country Park are grateful to the members of Palacerigg Community Trust, who have retained this community asset for the residents of the local communities near to the Country Park and beyond.

\*<u>S6M-15980</u> Paul Sweeney: Congratulations Emma Porter on Being Honoured in the Young Women's Movement's "30 under 30" List—That the Parliament congratulates Emma Porter, of Spirit of Springburn SCIO and Springburn Youth Forum, on being honoured in the Young Women's Movement's "30 under 30" list; understands that the nomination recognises the many years of hard work that Emma has put into community events and community participation in Springburn; further understands that Emma is a driving force for many community events that are enjoyed by thousands, including the Springburn Community Street Festival and the Springburn Community Christmas Market, and extends its very best wishes to Emma for continued success in the future.

\*<u>S6M-15979</u> Monica Lennon: Research Regarding the Effect of Alcohol Marketing on People with Alcohol Problems—That the Parliament welcomes new research, *A rapid literature review* 

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of the effect of alcohol marketing on people with, or at increased risk of, an alcohol problem, which was carried out by the University of Nottingham, and was commissioned by Alcohol Focus Scotland; recognises that there were 1,277 alcohol-specific deaths in Scotland in 2023; understands that people in Scotland are exposed to high levels of alcohol marketing on a daily basis and that this influences how much alcohol they drink; notes the findings of the review, that alcohol marketing is likely to have an effect on alcohol consumption amongst people with, or at increased risk of, an alcohol problem, and can act as a trigger for people in recovery from an alcohol problem; further notes from the evidence that people who drink heavily may be particularly vulnerable to the effects and influence of marketing; understands that, for people in recovery, alcohol adverts can be harmful, trigger cravings and potentially lead to relapse; considers that alcohol adverts often portray positive emotions and associations with drinking, which can lead to increased consumption for heavier drinkers, those with an alcohol use disorder, and people in recovery from an alcohol problem; further considers that the findings of this review imply that a causal association between alcohol marketing and alcohol use in people with, or at increased risk of an alcohol problem, is likely; believes that this adds weight to the argument for widespread marketing restrictions, and considers that regulating alcohol marketing would reduce people in Scotland's exposure to alcohol marketing, which, it believes, would in turn reduce alcohol consumption and harm, helping to improve the health and wellbeing of the nation.

\*<u>S6M-15978</u> Marie McNair: Bankie Comedian Donates to Local Charities—That the Parliament recognises the beloved Clydebank comedian, Kevin Bridges, for his generous donations to local charities; understands that youth charity Y Sort It received £10,000 to continue to help young people across West Dunbartonshire; further understands that West Dunbartonshire Community Foodshare received £30,000, which will allow the charity to deliver emergency food parcels and provisions to the community, and that local charities Bags Full of Love, Improving Lives and the Children's Hospices Across Scotland Christmas Appeal received donations from Kevin and his family, and celebrates Kevin's generosity and commitment to charity in his community.

\*S6M-15977 Pam Gosal: SP Energy Networks Awards £55,960 to Twechar Community

**Action**—That the Parliament congratulates Twechar Community Action on being awarded £55,960 from the SP Networks Net Zero Fund; notes that the group transformed the old recreation centre into Twechar Healthy Living and Enterprise Centre, which is a community hub that houses a full-time pharmacy, a satellite GP surgery, café, sports hall and meeting rooms, and hosts a vast range of activities and services; appreciates that funding will allow for the purchase of a new electric minibus, replacing an ageing diesel vehicle; acknowledges the organisation's efforts to decarbonise and reach its net zero targets; understands that the £5 million Net Zero Fund was launched in 2022 by SP Energy Networks, part of the Scottish Power group, to support vulnerable communities and ensure that no one is left behind on the country's journey to net zero emissions, and directly supports organisations within SP Energy Networks' transmission areas that have green ambitions and are looking to decarbonise their communities, and wishes the management and volunteers ongoing success with the project.
