*<u>S6M-15093</u> Clare Adamson: UK-EU Trade and Cooperation Agreement—That the Parliament notes the conclusions and recommendations contained in the Constitution, Europe, External Affairs and Culture Committee's 2nd Report, 2024 (Session 6), *UK-EU Trade and Cooperation Agreement: Barriers to trade in goods and opportunities to improve the UK-EU trading relationship* (SP Paper 639).

Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*<u>S6M-15156</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: Protecting Communities from Antisocial Behaviour and Antisocial Driving—That the Parliament notes with concern that many communities in Scotland, including those in the Edinburgh Western constituency such as South Queensferry, have been affected by antisocial behaviour and antisocial driving; understands that this kind of behaviour can have an impact on quality of life, businesses and community spaces; notes with concern the findings of the report, *Still living a nightmare: Understanding the experiences of victims of antisocial behaviour*, which has been published by Baroness Newlove and highlights the severe impact of unresolved antisocial behaviour on victims across the UK, including significant mental health issues; acknowledges and notes praise for the Silent Crime campaign for its work in raising awareness of what it believes are these often overlooked issues; recognises the hard work undertaken by Police Scotland and local authorities to tackle this behaviour, particularly around antisocial driving, and notes calls for the Scottish Government to create a national taskforce, which can examine and identify targeted measures to address this behaviour, including whether legislation can be tightened.

*<u>S6M-15158</u> Kevin Stewart: First Bus Acts of Kindness Campaign—That the Parliament welcomes the launch of First Bus's Acts of Kindness campaign in Aberdeen on 4 November 2024; notes that the month-long campaign, which aligns with World Kindness Day on 13 November, will

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see First Bus partnering with local businesses to spread joy and appreciation, supporting local businesses and raising a sense of unity among residents; understands that this will take the form of 50 exclusive items each day, from Wednesday through to Sunday, available for redemption using the special code, "First Bus Freebie", including lattes from Mount Café, cinnamon-sugar doughnuts from Dough & Co, scones from Books & Beans, and free tickets from Aberdeen Football Club; congratulates the businesses taking part in the campaign for these small acts of kindness, and hopes that many people find their day is made a little bit better as a result.

*<u>S6M-15157</u> Sandesh Gulhane: Community Cycling Project in Glasgow Receives Facilities Award from Sportscotland—That the Parliament welcomes the grant of a facilities award of £56,750 from sportscotland's Cycling Facilities Fund (CCF) to a cycling project in Glasgow; understands that Glasgow City Council will receive funding for the installation of toilets and storage containers at the Cathkin Braes Cycle Hub; recognises that the project aims to support wider community access for sport and physical activity in the area and allow greater use for coaching and youth participation; welcomes investment that builds on the growing interest in cycling following the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships, and hopes that the new facilities will encourage more people to take part in cycling in the area.

*S6M-15155 Alexander Stewart: Befriending Week 2024—That the Parliament welcomes Befriending Week 2024; understands that the event is held from 1 to 7 November each year, and is the national campaign celebrating and raising awareness of befriending and the positive impact that it has on individuals and communities; notes that, during this week, those in the befriending sector are invited to reflect on their achievements over the previous year, thank volunteers and staff, celebrate their service users, and share their message with stakeholders, government and the public; believes that Befriending Week is also an opportunity to look into the future by raising awareness of how befriending helps to tackle isolation and create community connections, inperson and at a distance; considers that Befriending Week was established in 2012 by the organisation known as Befriending Networks, a Scottish charity working in collaboration with its membership and strategic partners; acknowledges that there are many ways to get involved with Befriending Week, and that, each year, the charity releases a host of resources for people to use with their volunteers, service users and community; notes that it also facilitates events to help people plan their contribution to the campaign and throughout the week itself, including an annual conference, and commends everyone involved with befriending specifically to benefit the mental health and wellbeing of others.

*<u>S6M-15154</u> Annie Wells: Residents Turn Fly-tipping Lane into a Community Space — That the Parliament congratulates local residents living near Kingarth Lane who decided to take matters into their own hands by cleaning and clearing the extreme flying tipping that it understands has blighted the lane, and transformed it into a space for neighbours to meet and socialise; understands that residents of Kingarth Lane embarked on a small adventure to bring this vision to life by forming a working group to brainstorm ideas for lane events; acknowledges that ideas included creating planters for food growing, painting murals, hosting semi-regular events and workshops, and building outdoor seating and a play area, transforming it into a community space; recognises that, together with Kin Kitchen, the lane was transformed into a space where neighbours shared a meal prepared by Kin Kitchen; understands that, even with a small budget, by organising a community meal people were able to bring a dish and chair from home enjoy a

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meal together and get to know each other, better creating community spirit, and notes that Kin Kitchen will continue to work in collaboration with local residents doing more events in the lane, while the residents believe that the lane has the potential to become a vibrant community asset.

*S6M-15153 Ariane Burgess: Celebrating the Launch of Highland People's Power—That the Parliament celebrates the successful launch of Highland People's Power on 2 November 2024 at the Spectrum Centre in Inverness; acknowledges the organisation's vision to create a better energy industry in the Highlands and Scotland, one that benefits communities, workers, businesses, and the environment; understands that its aim is for the majority of energy generation in the Highlands to be owned and managed by local communities within 25 years, with 100% of the benefits distributed equitably across the region; commends its efforts to support communities in pursuing shared ownership of energy generation, including solar, wind, hydro and battery storage; recognises its commitment to distributing returns from energy projects into regional priorities, such as fuel poverty, housing and public services; applauds its dedication to building community wealth by using local businesses and suppliers, and keeping profits within the region through community ownership and control; notes that Highland People Power is planning a roadshow to speak to communities around the region; highlights what it sees as the importance of community-owned renewable energy in addressing fuel poverty, particularly in rural Scotland, where 36% of households are reportedly affected, and believes that this model is inspired by and can inspire similar initiatives across Scotland.

*<u>S6M-15152</u> John Mason: Oxfam Report, Carbon Inequality Kills—That the Parliament recognises what it considers to be the significant contribution of the wealthiest 1% of individuals to global carbon emissions, as highlighted in recent research on so-called carbon inequality by Oxfam; considers that excessive carbon emissions, particularly from luxury consumption, such as private jets, superyachts and high-polluting investments, deplete the world's remaining "carbon budget", exacerbating climate change impacts for the poorest and most vulnerable communities; urges governments to advocate for policies that reduce emissions by targeting what it sees as the excessive consumption and investment patterns of the "super-rich"; calls on policymakers to implement progressive taxes on high-emission assets and industries, and promotes systemic economic changes to reduce inequality and support a sustainable future.

*<u>S6M-15151</u> Kevin Stewart: Concerns Over Energy Tax Changes—That the Parliament notes with concern research from the University of Aberdeen, led by globally recognised energy economist, Professor Alex Kemp, which looks at the prospective effects of the changes to the Energy Profits Levy (EPL) that were announced in the UK Government's budget on 30 October 2024; understands that this analysis predicts that the removal and reduction of the investment and capital allowances will have an even greater effect on prospective returns on investment than increasing the headline rate of the EPL to 78%, leading to cancelled projects and reduced investment, with the unintended consequence of accelerating decommissioning and ultimately decelerating the energy transition to net zero; further understands that the research highlights that the UK currently relies on overseas sources for over 50% of oil and gas to meet its primary energy needs, and that this figure is set to increase to 2050, according to projections from the Climate Change Committee and the North Sea Transition Authority; believes that this research

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emphasises the need for the UK Government to take a more pragmatic approach to the North Sea oil and gas sector, and calls on the Chancellor of the Exchequer to rethink these changes, and for the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero to start engaging with the industry properly.

*<u>S6M-15149</u> Pam Gosal: Congratulating Bearsden Restaurant on Being Added to Michelin Guide—That the Parliament congratulates Bearsden restaurant, Elements, on being included in the prestigious Michelin Guide; understands that Elements only opened in July 2024, and has already been the recipient of what it sees as this extraordinary honour; commends head chef, Gary Townsend, and the rest of the staff at Elements for their achievement; notes that the Michelin Guide commended Elements for its interior design, its combination of classical techniques with Scottish ingredients, as well as its wine list; commends Gary Townsend and Elements for serving the local community in Bearsden and adding to the local economy and culture, and wishes the new business every success for the future.

*S6M-15148 Marie McNair: Clydebank and Milngavie Constituency Groups Awarded Over £500,000 in National Lottery Community Funding—That the Parliament recognises and congratulates 12 organisations from across the Clydebank and Milngavie constituency on being awarded a total of £509,191 from the National Lottery Community Fund; understands that Trauma Informed Parenting received an £18,050 grant, which will be used to offer workshops and other support using a trauma lens for parents, carers, teachers and anyone living or working with children with challenging behaviours; notes that Centre81 Steering Group received £15,000 to sustain a very popular after school club for young people of primary school age for a year; recognises that Clyde Shopmobility received a £125,229 grant, which will be used to hire two new staff members in order to increase its opening hours and reduce pressure on volunteers; understands that Clydebank Group Holiday received a £6,150 grant, which will be used to provide subsidised one-week holidays for Clydebank-based families, single parents and older people who are experiencing financial hardship; notes that Faifley Upcycling received a £7,266 grant, which will be used to provide donated clothes and household goods to homes in need; acknowledges that Flourishing Faifley received £93,977 to continue the employment of its Project Officer and to expand delivery of its wellbeing, learning and creative activities; notes that Golden Friendships received a £20,000 grant, which will be used to offer a warm space, free two-course hot meals and unlimited hot drinks every Tuesday from 5.00 pm to 7.00 pm, beginning October 2024 to the end of March 2025; understands that Growing Beardmore received a £2,310 grant, which will fund a composting toilet in the groups community garden; recognises that the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children received a £10,000 grant and will use the funding to engage young people, the police and the council in co-designing a media campaign promoting healthy relationships and behaviours online and offline; notes that OK Stay and Play received a £12,678 grant, which will be used to fund its community playgroup; understands that Stepping Stones Organisation (Mental Health) received a £178,887 grant to augment its existing mental health offer with dedicated neurodiversity support, which is open to everyone aged over 16 across West Dunbartonshire, and that Strathclyde Autistic Society received a £19,644 grant to run its twiceweekly clubs supporting the welfare of children with autism and their siblings in West Dunbartonshire; congratulates all of the staff and volunteers associated with these groups, and thanks them for working tirelessly to make their community a better place.

*<u>S6M-15147</u> Marie McNair: Old Kilpatrick Primary Teacher Sophie Wilson Wins Prestigious Award — That the Parliament congratulates Sophie Wilson, from Old Kilpatrick, on winning the George D Gray Award in recognition of her fourth year dissertation, *"I like to move it, move it"*: An *investigation of children's motivation for Physical Education; an upper school Scottish Primary context*; understands that her dissertation investigated older primary school children's levels of motivation towards and in physical education, with her findings suggesting that positive correlations exist between autonomous motivation and each of the three basic psychological needs of competence, autonomy and relatedness; notes that this award recognises notable assignments by an initial teacher education student completing a primary teacher education programme in Scotland; believes that Sophie is a well-deserving recipient of this award; thanks her for using her passion to encourage school pupils to exercise, and wishes her all the best for the rest of her probationary year.

*<u>S6M-15145</u> Christine Grahame: Prison Officers Association Food Bank Donation—That the Parliament notes that the Prison Officers Association (POA) Scotland recently held its annual conference in the Peebles Hydro; understands that the union's conference delegates and guests donated over 350 kg of food and a financial donation to the Peeblesshire food bank, which takes the total to over 900 kg in the last two years, and congratulates POA on this excellent initiative and its commitment to try to mitigate, where possible, food insecurity and poverty.

<Access to Elected Office Fund

- (1) The Scottish Ministers must maintain a fund—
 - (a) that is named the Access to Elected Office Fund,
 - (b) that provides financial support to disabled persons (within the meaning of section 6(2) of the Equality Act 2010) participating as candidates in—
 - (i) a Scottish Parliamentary general election,
 - (ii) an election held under section 9 of the Scotland Act 1998 (constituency vacancies), or
 - (iii) a local government election (within the meaning of section 204(1) of the Representation of the People Act 1983).
- (2) The Scottish Ministers may from time to time make payments into the Fund of such amounts as they may determine.
- (3) The Scottish Ministers must make arrangements—
 - (a) about the procedure or rules for making payments out of the Fund to disabled persons who are candidates at an election mentioned in paragraphs (i) to (iii) of subsection (1)(b),
 - (b) designating a person to be responsible to administer the making of payments in accordance with that procedure or rules.
- (4) The arrangements under subsection (3)(a) must include provision that payments are only to be made to candidates to the extent that they are reasonably attributable to the candidate having a physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on the candidate's ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities.

- (6) The duties mentioned in subsections (1) and (3) may be fulfilled by the continuation of any existing fund which is established and maintained administratively by the Scottish Ministers, including continuing with the administrative arrangements for that fund and with the person responsible for administering that fund (without the need for designation under subsection (5)).
- (7) As soon as reasonably practicable after each ordinary general election for membership of the Parliament (see section 2 of the Scotland Act 1998) and each ordinary local election (within the meaning of section 43(1C) of the Representation of the People Act 1983), the Scottish Ministers must—
 - (a) prepare a report on the operation of the Fund,
 - (b) publish the report in such manner as they consider appropriate.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
