*S6M-15573 Kenneth Gibson: Recognising the Legacy of Dr Henry Faulds, Originator of Fingerprint Identification, on the 150th Anniversary of his Medical Mission to Japan—That the Parliament celebrates the 150th anniversary of Dr Henry Faulds, an Ayrshire man born in Beith in 1843, undertaking Scotland's first medical mission to Japan; recognises his groundbreaking achievements, including being the first person to conceive and test the concept that fingerprints are a form of biometrics, that is, a unique means of identifying people, and that this discovery has revolutionised forensic science and criminal investigation worldwide; acknowledges his extraordinary contributions in Japan, where he not only founded a hospital and teaching facility, but also established a society for the blind, successfully halted a rabies epidemic, and eradicated a plague, and commends his enduring legacy as a trailblazer in medicine and science, while strengthening what it sees as Scotland's historical and cultural ties with Japan.

*S6M-15561 Monica Lennon: "Still Silent?" - Scottish Trades Union Congress Report on Sexual Harassment —That the Parliament notes the findings of the Scottish Trades Union Congress (STUC) report, Still Silent?: STUC Women's Committee Survey of Women in Scotland's Experiences of Sexual Harassment, believes that the report shows an increase in the amount of sexual harassment experienced by women online, in addition to previous findings from the STUC showing that more than 50% of women had experienced harassment within the workplace; strongly condemns what it believes to be the rising level of sexual harassment both within and outwith the workplace; supports the STUC's view that sexual harassment has become "endemic"; welcomes the UK Worker Protection (Amendment of Equality Act 2010) Act 2023, which places a statutory duty on employers to take reasonable steps to prevent sexual harassment of their workers, but believes that this Act should be enhanced and built upon; implores both the Scottish and UK governments to take seriously what it considers to be their duty to protect workers from abuse, and pledges to work with them, employers, trade unions and others to ensure that workers, and predominantly women workers, do not suffer in silence as a result of sexual harassment both in and out of the workplace.

*S6M-15560 Neil Bibby: Paisley's STAR Project Celebrates its 25th Birthday—That the Parliament congratulates the STAR Project, which is based in Paisley, on its 25th anniversary; recognises that the charity, which was established in 1999, helps the community in many ways, including people experiencing mental health and domestic abuse; notes that it also teaches people new skills such as literacy and art; understands that the group was created to assist adults and children living in poverty throughout Paisley and the surrounding area and has helped 58,949 people since its establishment; notes that the STAR Project held a birthday party celebrating the milestone on 15 November 2024, and recognises that it is planning for the future as it aims to further develop its outreach by creating a new hub in the town.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
