Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-16078 Oliver Mundell: Celebrating the Continued Social, Cultural and Economic Importance of Robert Burns—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the lasting impact of Scotland's national bard, Robert Burns, including the significant contribution that his works continue to make at home and around the world; notes with interest and admiration the efforts of many across Scotland and the world to ensure that his legacy is celebrated; acknowledges, in particular, a number of initiatives in Dumfries and Galloway that have progressed since Burns' Night 2024; congratulates the Ellisland Farm project, which is led by the former MSP, Joan McAlpine, on receiving an initial grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund of almost £500,000 towards developing and restoring the farm and museum; believes that the restoration scheme has the potential to be a gamechanger for the region and to redefine the Burns' visitor experience; acknowledges what it sees as the growing partnership between Annadale Distillery and the Globe Inn; notes the 10th anniversary of the distillery and its Man O' Words Whisky, which takes its inspiration from Burns, and welcomes the return of the Big Burns Supper in Dumfries.

*S6M-16045 Christine Grahame: Ending Low Welfare Animal Activities Abroad—That the Parliament believes that wild animals are exploited globally on a massive scale for entertainment, including being forced to undertake unnatural behaviours to train them to perform; considers that dolphin entertainment, such as "swim-with" experiences and dolphin shows, elephant rides and bathing, tiger selfies and various other forms of wild animal entertainment are cruel and that the training methods and the enclosures in which they are kept cannot meet their welfare needs; recognises that the sale and advertising of these overseas activities is supporting and allowing the trade to continue; considers that, while travel companies continue to sell low-welfare activities abroad, the trade will continue, and notes the reported view of many people in Midlothian South, Tweeddale and Lauderdale and across Scotland, that domestic legislation to prohibit the sale and advertisement of low-welfare animal activities abroad is a policy that would reduce considerably the cruel exploitation of wild animals trapped in the tourist entertainment industry.

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Other new and altered motions and amendments

*S6M-16070 Claire Baker: Fife Golf Course Dumbarnie Links in Upper Largo Awarded Five Prizes in 2024—That the Parliament celebrates that Dumbarnie Links in Upper Largo in Fife received five major golf awards in 2024; understands that the course was named as the Top Emerging Golf Course in the UK and was recognised for offering a diverse range of qualities along the Largo Bay coastline at the recent finals of the Golf Course Awards; notes that this followed four other top awards, the Best Golf Experience at the Scotland SME awards, the Global Golf Course accolade at the Luxury Travel Awards, the Best Golf Course in Western Europe by the International Association Golf Tour Operators, and the award for the Best Clubhouse in Scotland at the Scottish Golf Tourism Awards; commends the Dumbarnie team's involvement in the Caddie School for Soldiers, a charity that was created in 2019, where soldiers can play the course and get some advice and support on the golf range; recognises that, since Dumbarnie's opening during the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions in 2000, it now ranks highly on the international league table of great golf courses; congratulates Dumbarnie on its fifth anniversary and on gathering an international reputation, and extends its very best wishes for continued success in the future.

*S6M-16066 Jeremy Balfour: Edinburgh IJB Charity Grant Scrapping—That the Parliament notes what it sees as the significant cross-party concern at the reported plan by Edinburgh Integration Joint Board (IJB) to scrap its £4.5 million charity grant programme at the end of June 2025, thereby ending funding for all 64 charities that currently deliver services throughout the city with its support; acknowledges a statement by one current grant recipient, Scottish Huntington's Association, that such charities are "the fence at the top of the cliff that diminish the requirement for emergency support at the bottom"; urges Edinburgh IJB to listen to the argument that abolishing such preventative spending with its charity partners is a false economy, which will ultimately increase costs by driving service users to what it considers is the city's already overstretched and significantly more expensive statutory sector, including primary care and secondary acute and emergency services, and calls on Edinburgh IJB, Edinburgh Health and Social Care Partnership, Edinburgh City Council and NHS Lothian to work together with all relevant local and national stakeholders to prevent these reductions from coming to pass, in light of what it believes would be the devastating impact that they would have on the essential charity sector, including the thousands of vulnerable people it supports across the city on a daily basis.

*S6M-16065 Alexander Stewart: CAMRA Raises Over £800 for Resonate Together in Alloa—That the Parliament congratulates the Campaign for Real Ale (CAMRA) on raising funds for an Alloa charity before Christmas; understands that CAMRA selected Resonate Together, a social enterprise with charitable status, as its official charity partner for the Forth Valley Ale and Cider Festival; further understands that the festival was held in Alloa's town hall during November 2024, with the fundraising total being revealed after the festive season; notes that attendees to the festival raised more than £800 for Resonate Together, which specialises in using art at the Carsebridge Cultural Campus to further its wider mission of building a stronger, more vibrant community; further notes that, throughout the two-day celebration of all things ale and cider, volunteers from Resonate were on hand to inform attendees about its work and ongoing plans to save the historic Carsebridge distillery buildings; commends everyone involved, including the volunteers, for their tireless and community-focused endeavours, and further commends the local residents for their generosity with donations.

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*S6M-16064 Alexander Stewart: Tullibody Community Garden Festive Events for Residents—That the Parliament welcomes the news that Tullibody Community Garden held two festive events for residents over the Christmas holidays; understands that more than 30 people attended a wreath-making event in December 2024, which assisted them in crafting and decorating their own decorative garlands; notes that these items were constructed from the garden's willow, while the decorations all came from natural materials; understands that, in addition to this, a Christmas on a Budget cookery session was organised by Val Whyte, the garden's community cook, who coached visitors to this workshop on how to make cheap and easy meals, with a focus of going back to basics while acquiring ingredients for the best value, and commends everyone at the Community Garden for this and all of their community-focused activities.

*S6M-16062 Stuart McMillan: Inverclyde Council and HSCP Awarded National Bereavement Charter for Scotland—That the Parliament congratulates Inverclyde Council and Inverclyde Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) on becoming the first local authority in Scotland to receive the National Bereavement Charter for Scotland; recognises what it sees as this prestigious achievement as a testament to the local authority's commitment to supporting its staff through bereavement; commends the collaborative efforts of Inverclyde Council, Inverclyde HSCP and Compassionate Inverclyde in implementing the charter as a guiding vision for bereavement support across the organisations; applauds the provision of bereavement training for line managers and the creation of an animated video promoting the charter, which has been shared widely among staff groups; understands that Inverclyde Council successfully met three key criteria to qualify for the Charter Mark, which were, informing all staff about the charter, adopting a Bereavement Policy and developing and displaying a workplace bereavement charter, and celebrates what it considers as this innovative approach as an example of best practice in creating compassionate and supportive workplaces in Scotland.
