### S6M-16148 Alex Rowley: Scottish Engineering's Engineering Skills Gap Analysis for

**Scotland**—That the Parliament notes the publication of Scottish Engineering's report, *Engineering* Skills Gaps Analysis for Scotland; is concerned by the findings of the report, the production of which aims to allow industry and government to work in partnership to maximise the opportunities for Scotland's economy, and its society as a result; notes that the results in the report are derived from the output of a survey of 70 engineering companies based on their operations in Scotland; is concerned with the findings of the report that skills pipeline gaps for existing industry are "an immediately stark situation" with "no allowance for the additional demands" of offshore wind, grid infrastructure investment, decarbonising heat energy or green hydrogen production; notes the view from the survey that "unless there is a rapid change in the required skills investment there is a considerable risk of damage to incumbent industry [and a] risk to inward investors of failure to reach the skilled staffing levels they require, with negative impact on their projects, and reputational risk to Scotland's ability to accommodate such opportunity"; further notes the view that the Scottish and UK governments must encourage the next generation of skilled workers and make the funding and resources needed available to provide the apprenticeships of today for the jobs of tomorrow, and notes the calls in the Mid Scotland and Fife region and across the country for the Scottish Government to take action to foster a new partnership between schools, colleges, universities and industry to ensure that young people are aware and able to take advantage of the opportunities available in Scotland's industrial sector, and that the future of Scottish industry is secured for the benefit of people across Scotland.

#### Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

#### \*<u>S6M-16287</u> Kenneth Gibson: The Ongoing Impact of PFI/PPP on Scotland's Public

**Finances**—That the Parliament believes that the total unitary charge payments associated with Public Private Partnership/Private Finance Initiative (PPP/PFI) contracts that were paid across the public sector in Scotland from 2006-07 to 2022-23 amounted to £14.173 billion; understands that PFI/PPPs are long-term contractual arrangements between a public sector entity and a private sector provider, which were introduced by the Conservative UK administration in 1992 and then expanded by Labour following its 1997 election victory; believes that the total PFI and PPP unitary charge payments to be paid across the public sector in Scotland in 2025-26 will be £1.25 billion. the highest in a single year, with the remaining cost associated with PFI/PPP being £14.699 billion from 2023-24; understands that, by 2038, North Ayrshire Council will have paid £440.1 million for four schools that were built for £83 million; notes that research carried out by the National Institute of Economic and Social Research shows that successive UK administrations have made payments to private companies associated with PFI contracts at, on average, more than three times the cost of construction, with said companies distributing £300 million in dividends to investors from £1 billion in profits between 2005 and 2022; recognises that the scheme was abandoned by the UK Government in 2018, 11 years after being replaced with an alternative model known as non-profit distributing (NPD) by the Scottish Government to limit excessive private sector profits; notes with concern media reports that the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rachel Reeves MP, is considering relaunching the PPP funding model frequently used by Tony Blair's Labour administration; considers PFI/PPP to have had a disastrous impact on Scotland's public finances, and notes the calls for the UK Government to end what it sees as its obsession with PFI/PPP.

\*<u>S6M-16282</u> Beatrice Wishart: Opportunities and Challenges for Scotland's Fishing Sector in 2025—That the Parliament commends the hard-working fishermen of island and coastal communities, including in the Shetland Islands constituency; understands that, as published in the most recent Marine Economic Statistics in December 2024, fishing contributed £335 million to Scotland's economy in 2022, including £83.3 million from Shetland; notes the dangerous nature of the open sea and the at-sea dangers of manmade infrastructure, as well as from other fishing vessels conducting dangerous procedures and manoeuvres; further notes concern in the sector

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about increasing competition for marine space and the calls to establish designated cable corridors as a means of addressing spatial squeeze and promoting co-operation; recognises the cultural and economic significance of fishing to Scotland; highlights fish as what it sees as a sustainable, low-carbon source of protein; understands that the Scottish Government has not held a debate on fisheries since 2022, and notes the belief that action to address spatial squeeze in Scotland's seas is in the long-term interests of the fishing sector as well as the wider Scottish economy.

#### Other new and altered motions and amendments

\*<u>S6M-16273</u> Mark Ruskell: Supporting Scottish Raptor Study Group Volunteers—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the importance of the work of the Scottish Raptor Study Group (SRSG) to bird of prey conservation; notes in particular the dedication of its 360 members in all parts of the country in monitoring birds of prey on a voluntary basis, in nearly 5,300 home ranges, as part of the award-winning Scottish Raptor Monitoring Scheme; further notes with concern the recent reported challenges to their right of access to land whilst monitoring schedule 1 birds under licence, for the purposes of scientific monitoring, without prior notification of some landowners, and expresses its expectation that SRSG members should continue to be able to access land for scientific purposes as previously, in light of what it regards as the importance of their work and their long history of responsible access since the group's foundation in 1980.

\*<u>S6M-16262</u> Stephen Kerr: Kinneil Museum Faces Closure—That the Parliament recognises that the Kinneil Museum, which is located in the Kinneil Estate, where James Watt developed the modern steam engine, faces potential closure; understands that this threat comes from Falkirk Council's cost-saving Strategic Property Review; has deep concerns about what it sees as the impact that cuts to local government funding settlements are having on the preservation of local heritage, and believes that local authorities, Historic Environment Scotland, the National Trust for Scotland and other public bodies need greater support to preserve Scotland's unique and proud heritage.

\*<u>S6M-16261</u> Foysol Choudhury: Supporting Efforts to Challenge Global Debt in 2025—That the Parliament welcomes the Scottish Catholic International Aid Fund's (SCIAF) involvement in a global campaign to challenge debt during its jubilee year; notes that Pope Francis has urged the international community "to work towards forgiving foreign debt in recognition of the ecological debt existing between the north and the south of this world"; believes that this is the worst global debt crisis in 30 years, with the vast majority of debt held by private creditors, such as hedge funds and oil traders; further believes that countries supported by Scotland's International Development Fund, such as Malawi and Zambia, are forced to spend more on debt repayments than on their entire health and education budgets combined; understands that 54 countries are in debt crisis and this issue is cyclical, as previous debt relief efforts did not address the root causes or ensure a fairer system; agrees with calls for a permanent and fairer UN solution and improvements to the interim G20 debt relief process; welcomes the campaign efforts across the UK under the banner of Cancel Debt, Choose Hope, and calls on the Scottish Government to echo calls for a fairer system.

\*S6M-16260 Jackie Dunbar: Ashgrove and Stockethill Community Council Volunteers Tackle Icy Pavements—That the Parliament recognises the work of the volunteer winter gritting

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team of Ashgrove and Stockethill Community Council; understands that the group was provided with gritting equipment, which was funded as part of an NHS Grampian project to reduce falls in the community; notes that, in a report published by NHS Grampian, there had been a reduction in the number of falls in areas where the volunteer winter gritting team operated during winter 2023-24, and that this reduction was estimated to be between 28% and 83% depending on the method of analysis used; thanks the volunteers at Ashgrove and Stockethill Community Council for their great work, and wishes them all the best.

\*<u>S6M-16259</u> Colin Beattie: Skyrora Named in the Sunday Times 100 Tech List—That the Parliament congratulates Skyrora on being listed in *The Sunday Times* 100 Tech list for 2025, a ranking of the UK's fastest-growing private tech companies; notes reports that the company achieved 99.26% annual sales growth, generating £30.8 million in 2024; believes that all the companies included in the list created a combined 11,200 new jobs in the UK; recognises Skyrora's continuous hard work and innovation in its mission to reach orbit through environmentally-conscious space technologies, and wishes everyone at Skyrora all the best going forward with their future endeavours.

\*<u>S6M-16256</u> Mark Ruskell: Congratulating Recyke-a-bike on its 20th Anniversary — That the Parliament congratulates Recyke-a-bike on its 20th anniversary; understands that the project has a central aim of working to relieve poverty within its local community and improve health, education and the environment through cycling; recognises what it sees as the positive impact its key projects, including 'bikebility' sessions at local schools and delivering bike mechanic courses, have had in these local communities; commends its efforts to help more people choose cycling for low carbon transport, which includes providing the opportunity for people to hire bikes for free for up to 25 days, and giving away around 250 bikes in the last year to families in areas of high deprivation and New Scots, and wishes Recyke-a-bike every success as it continues to provide this important work.

\*<u>S6M-16255</u> Paul O'Kane: Bishopton Primary School Recognised for Achievements in International Eco-Schools Programme—That the Parliament congratulates Bishopton Primary School for its environmental achievements in the international Eco-Schools programme; understands that the school was visited by Keep Scotland Beautiful and awarded a certificate to commend its student voice; further understands that Eco-Schools is the largest sustainable schools programme in the world and that this visit was delivered as part of the 30th anniversary celebrations, and commends Bishopton Primary School for its continued contribution to education on environmental efforts.

\*<u>S6M-16253</u> Kevin Stewart: Congratulations to the Aberdeen Youth Movement on Winning the 2025 Anne Frank Award—That the Parliament congratulates the Aberdeen Youth Movement (AYM) on receiving the Anne Frank 2025 Award from Action for a Fairer World and Grampian Regional Equality Council (GREC), in recognition of its commitment to children's rights; notes that GREC's Anne Frank Award celebrates the work done by young people to promote equality and human rights in their schools and wider communities; understands that AYM is the official voice of young people in Aberdeen, working with multiple organisations in the city to improve the representation of young people in the Granite City, and consists of young people, aged between 14 and 25, from different areas and interest groups; believes that this award is a testament to the hard work and effort by AYM's youth councillors in ensuring young people in Aberdeen have a voice at local, citywide, national and international levels, and wishes them all the best for the rest of 2025 and beyond.

Genocide—That the Parliament marks the 80th anniversary of the Holocaust and acknowledges the 30th anniversary of the Srebrenica genocide, in which 8,372 predominantly Bosnian Muslim men and boys were murdered; believes that this remains the worst atrocity on European soil since the Second World War; condemns the broader violence and ethnic cleansing that it considers ravaged Bosnia and Herzegovina in the early 1990s, which resulted in the deaths of over 100,000 people and the displacement of over two million more, and calls for continued efforts to ensure that such horrors are never forgotten and are not allowed to be repeated; believes that the genocide in Srebrenica did not occur overnight, but was the culmination of years of hostility, propaganda, disinformation, oppression, marginalisation, discrimination and hate speech, leading to widespread violence; supports the work of the Beyond Srebrenica charity, formerly known as Remembering Srebrenica Scotland, which, through its efforts in Scotland, works to raise public awareness about the causes and effects of hatred, intolerance and prejudice in society, as well as to promote the elimination of discrimination based on race, ethnicity or religion; encourages further educational initiatives by Beyond Srebrenica that help to promote understanding, reconciliation and tolerance within Scotland, while also remembering the atrocities of Srebrenica and other acts of systematic discrimination, which have led, or have the potential to lead, to genocide, and calls on the Scottish Government to continue supporting international initiatives aimed at promoting peace, justice and human rights, both in the Balkans and globally, as part of Scotland's commitment to a world free from prejudice, hatred and violence.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
