Access to Justice roundtable

Note by the Clerk

Introduction

- 1. The Equalities, Human Rights and Civil Justice Committee agreed to hold a number of roundtable meetings about subjects within its remit.
- It held its first civil justice roundtable session at its meeting on <u>30 November</u> <u>2021</u>, which focused on the use of remote hearings within the civil justice sector as a result of Covid-19 and the sector's experience and future plans for digital justice as we recover from the pandemic.
- 3. At its meeting on <u>22 February 2022</u>, it held a family law roundtable which focused on the law applying to disputes between parents and the care of their children.
- 4. The next session an access to justice roundtable will be held at the meeting on 14 March 2023. It will focus on how services are currently supporting people who are seeking advice, challenges these services are facing, access to funding as well as hearing views on legal aid reform.

 - Access to funding
 - How digital exclusion can be addressed and whether the increase of online engagement since the pandemic has created further challenges.
 - Legal aid reform in Scotland and whether services would like to see greater coordination between legal and support/advice services
